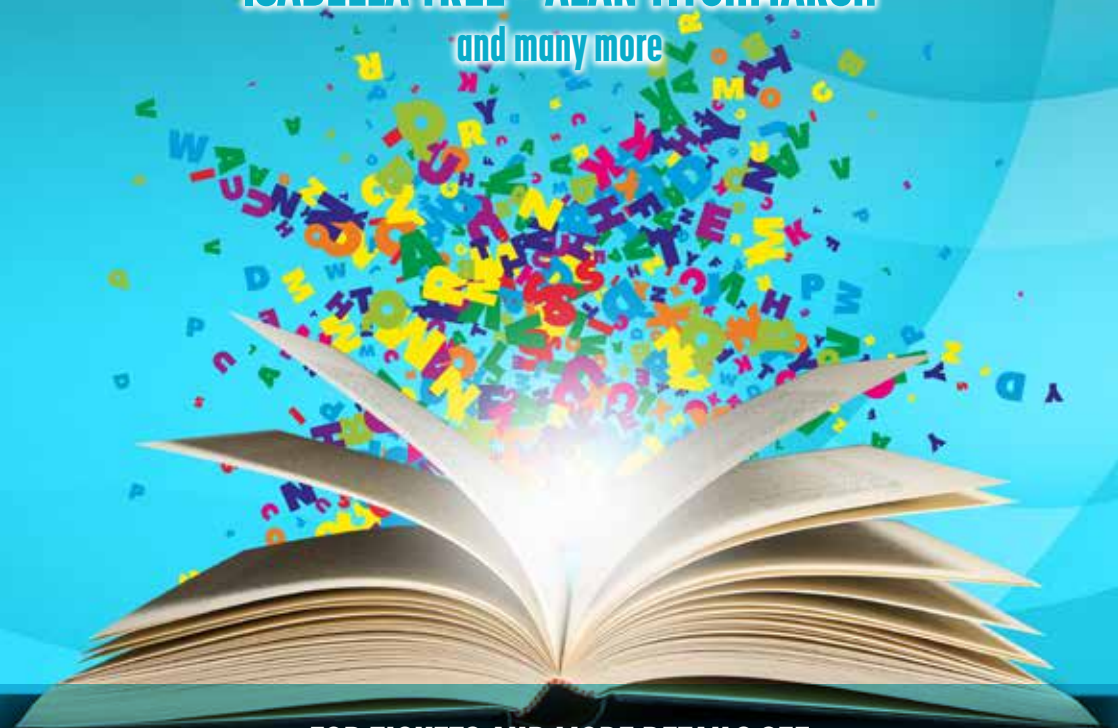

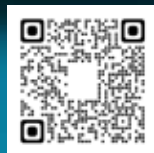

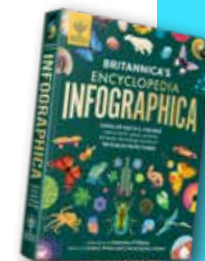

Sheila Hancock – Old Rage

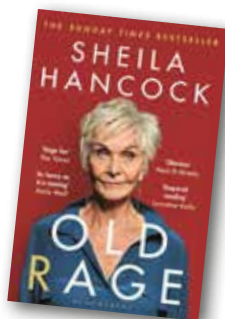

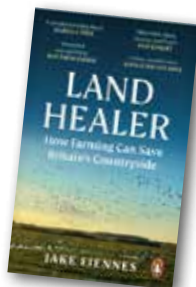

Michael Ball – Different Aspects

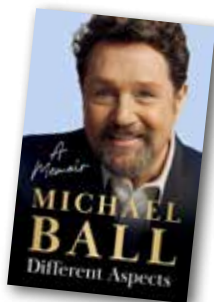

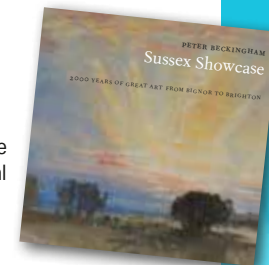
Peter Beckingham – Sussex Showcase

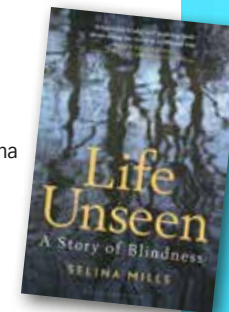
Selina Mills – Life Unseen

Martin Sixsmith – The Russia Conundrum

In conversation with Stewart Collins

The BBC's former Moscow correspondent **Martin Sixsmith** talks about a book co-written with **Mikhail Khodorkovsky**, a man who has seen behind the mask of Vladimir Putin. Once a successful oil tycoon and ranked 16th on Forbes list of world billionaires, Khodorkovsky spoke out against the corruption of Putin's regime and was punished by the Kremlin, stripped of his entire wealth, and jailed for over ten years. Now free and working as a pro-democracy campaigner in enforced exile, *The Russia Conundrum* is his vivid insight into the desires and damning truths of Putin's Russia.

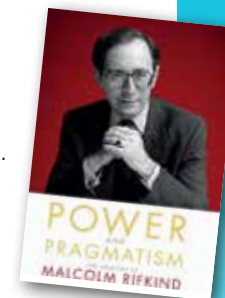
We meet a politician whose political career has been as glittering as it has been long-lived. As a minister for eighteen years, **Malcolm Rifkind** saw longer uninterrupted service than anyone since Lord Palmerston in the early nineteenth century and had a ringside seat during the turbulent years of the late 20th century.

Power & Pragmatism tells the inside story – his battles with Margaret Thatcher over Scotland to his five pivotal years as Chairman of the Intelligence and Security Committee, overseeing GCHQ, working with MI6, and meeting the CIA: the shrewd, humorous and frank memoir of a genuine political heavyweight.

Con Coughlin – Assad: A Triumph of Tyranny

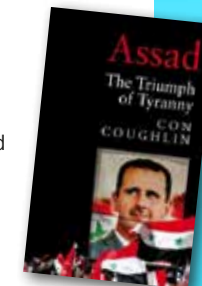

Until the Arab Spring of 2011, the world's view of Bashar al-Assad was largely benign. He and his wife, a former British banker, were viewed as philanthropic individuals doing their best to keep their country at peace. So much so that a profile of Mrs Assad in American *Vogue* was headlined 'The Rose in the Desert'.

Shortly after it appeared, Syria descended into the horrific civil war that has seen its cities reduced to rubble and thousands murdered and displaced, a civil war that is still raging over a decade later. Defence and Security Editor of the *Daily Telegraph* **Con Coughlin** discusses his analysis of this great unfolding tragedy.
